- When? May 12, 2025 (2nd Monday of May)
- Who can vote? 18+ years old, registered voters
- Voter registration deadline? September 30, 2025

- Check your voter status at COMELEC! Make sure you're registered.
- Research candidates— Don't just rely on TikTok & memes! Check their track record & platforms. Email or @ them to ask questions directly.
- Call out fake news & online attacks—Disinformation is one of the biggest threats to fair elections.
- Educate your circle—Share legit info with friends & family.
- Vote wisely! Your vote = real impact.

m National Positions

SENATE

- 12 Senators (out of 24) will be elected
 - Senators serve 6-year terms
- They create national laws, review policies, and check the executive branch

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

- 316 Members of Congress
- 253 District Representatives (one per legislative district)
- 63 Party-List Representatives (elected through a proportional system)
- They craft laws and budget allocations, and can impeach high officials

Local Government **Positions**


PROVINCIAL LEVEL

- ✓ All Provincial Officials
 - 81 Governors 🟆 (one per province)
 - 81 Vice Governors
 - Sangguniang Panlalawigan (Provincial **Board Members**)
 - Each province has multiple districts, and each district elects 2-3 **Board Members**

CITY/MUNICIPAL LEVEL

- ✓ City & Municipal Officials
 - All Mayors in
 - All Vice Mayors 👤
 - City & Municipal Councilors (Up to 8 per district, depending on LGU)





the party-list system




The Party-list System is a way for underrepresented sectors to have a voice in Congress. These sectors include workers, farmers, youth, women, indigenous people, and more. Instead of voting for individual politicians, people vote for a party that represents their sector.

how does it work?

1 You Vote for a Party, Not a Person

On Election Day, aside from voting for district representatives, you also vote for one (1) party-list group from the official list.



2 Getting Seats in Congress

A party needs at least 2% of the total party-list votes to secure one seat in the House of Representatives.

The top voted parties can have up to 3 seats max each.

3 Who Gets In?

The elected party-list representatives are chosen from a list submitted by the party before the elections.



the party-list system

🏃 who can run?

- Organizations
 representing marginalized
 sectors (e.g., youth,
 farmers, workers,
 indigenous people, etc)
- Political parties (as long as they advocate for underrepresented groups)
- National, regional, or sectoral organizations with clear platforms

🏖 who can't run?

- Oroups that don't actually represent marginalized sectors (Beware of fakes!)
- Neligious groups (separation of Church and State, bestie!)
- Sometimes of the control of the c

🔐 the tea: controversies and issues

- Some political dynasties and rich families have hijacked the system by creating their own "party-list" groups.
- Some fake party-lists claim to represent marginalized groups but actually serve personal or political interests.





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

Shade your ballot clearly

Feed your ballot in the machine by yourself and wait for the confirmation.

Report anything sketchy to the election officers or watchdog groups.
